On July 18, 2005, President Bush announced a global partnership with India to promote stability, democracy, prosperity and peace. The desire to transform relations with India, according to Administration officials, is founded upon a strategic vision that transcends even today's most pressing security concerns. President Bush said he would work to achieve full civil nuclear energy cooperation with India and would also seek agreement from Congress to adjust U. S. laws and policies. Administration officials have described the agreement as bringing India into the nonproliferation mainstream. For 30 years, India has remained outside the mainstream: it rejected the Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty (NPT) as discriminatory and exploded a peaceful nuclear device in 1974 that convinced the world of the need for greater restrictions on nuclear trade. The United States created the Nuclear Suppliers Group as a direct response to India's test, halted nuclear exports to India a few years later, and worked to convince other states to do the same. Nonproliferation experts have suggested that potential costs to U. S. and global nonproliferation policy of bringing India into the nonproliferation mainstream in...
